# What can you do with Open Projects?

- Develop code, APIs, specs, protocols, and reference implementations **in one place**.
- Work under popular open source licenses.
- Advance deliverables through standards approval process
- Submit approved work for international recognition from ISO, IEC, ITU, ANSI, or EU via MSP

# Why open source *and* standards?

1

A spec can serve as a blueprint that makes it easier to scope and develop code.

2

Governments often require an approved standard before they will purchase or recommend.

3

Open source implementations **prove and improve** specs.

4

Certification test suites can be hard to write based on code alone.

5

Specs can be easier for non-coders to understand.

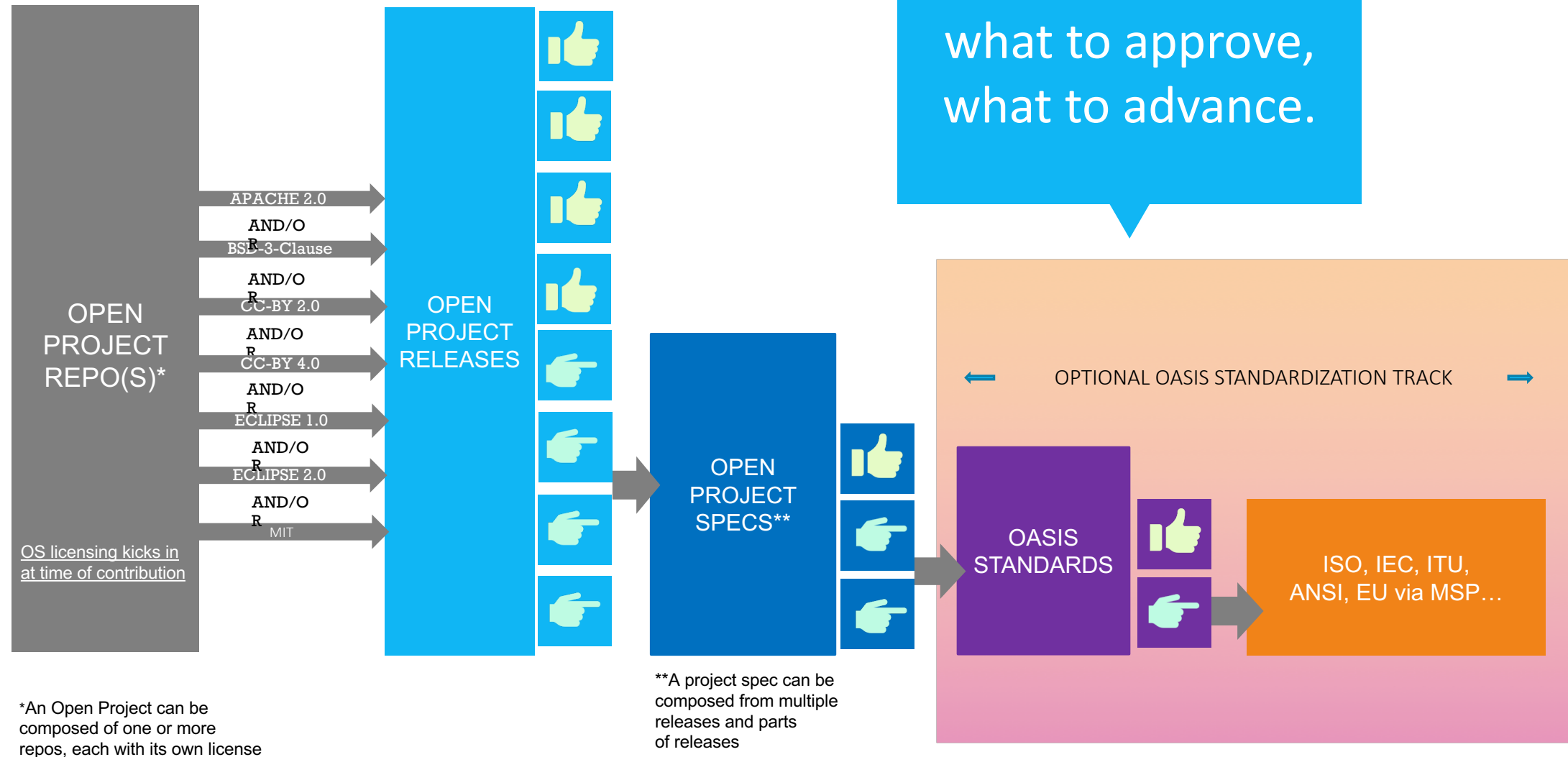

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Participating in an Open Project doesn't require commitment to "one-size-binds-all" IPR Policy.

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Each Open Project selects licenses appropriate for its work.

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People only commit to the terms of Projects in which they contribute.

## Stakeholder Leadership + Community Development.

### Open Project Governing Board\*

May form Technical Steering Committee, Marketing Committee  
Votes on releases, appoints Maintainers  
Decides if/when to submit to OASIS standards track, ISO, IEC, ITU,  
Works with staff on community building, promotion, events...  
Provides funding via annual Project sponsorship

**Maintainers\***  
Authorize pull requests

**Contributors\***  
Contribute actionable  
pull requests

**Participants**  
Submit comments, bug reports,  
feature requests

## Sponsoring Open Projects

Everyone can contribute to an Open Project.

Project sponsors also:

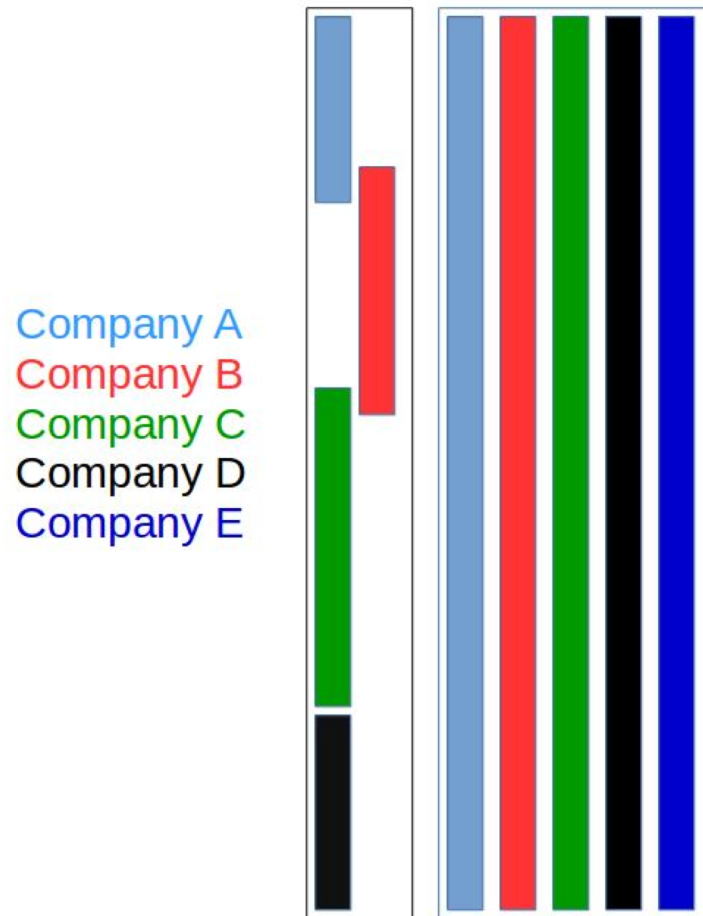
- ✓ **Govern** technical agenda and marketing activities via a seat on Project Governing Board (one-org/one-vote)
- ✓ **Form** Technical Steering Committee and/or Marketing Committee (*optional*)
- ✓ **Get recognized as leaders** on Project web sites and social networks, events, press and analyst communications.
- ✓ **Appoint** Maintainers and elect Chairs.
- ✓ **Decide** which work projects to advance through standards process
- ✓ **Request** OASIS submission of approved work to ISO, IEC, ITU, etc.
- ✓ **Create** sub-Projects.



# Open Projects IPR Design Issues

## Two Main IPR Issues

- The leading open source licenses (e.g. Apache, EPL, MIT) do not grant sufficient rights for derived specifications or alternate implementations of contributed work.
- Even with an enhanced CLA (contributor's license agreement) the IPR protections fall well short of what traditional standards provide and what Enterprise vendors have come to rely upon.



- Let's suppose we've somehow addressed the first issue by enhancing the CLA. So what's the issue now?
- The left side shows the IPR commitments made under an enhanced CLA.
- The right side shows the IPR commitments made for similar work by a traditional standards committee.
- The difference is material and will inhibit or prevent alternative implementations by companies who don't like being sued (which is most of them!)

## How Did OASIS Solve This?

- With a great deal of pain. 😊
- OASIS counsel worked closely with lead IPR counsels from IBM, Microsoft, and Oracle for over six months to design a solution which (surprise!) had two key elements.
- First, an enhanced CLA.
- Second, a governance design that both encouraged and compelled the project leaders to make IPR commitments to the entire body of work.
- Warning: easier said than done! The legal solution and the business solution must be synergistic.

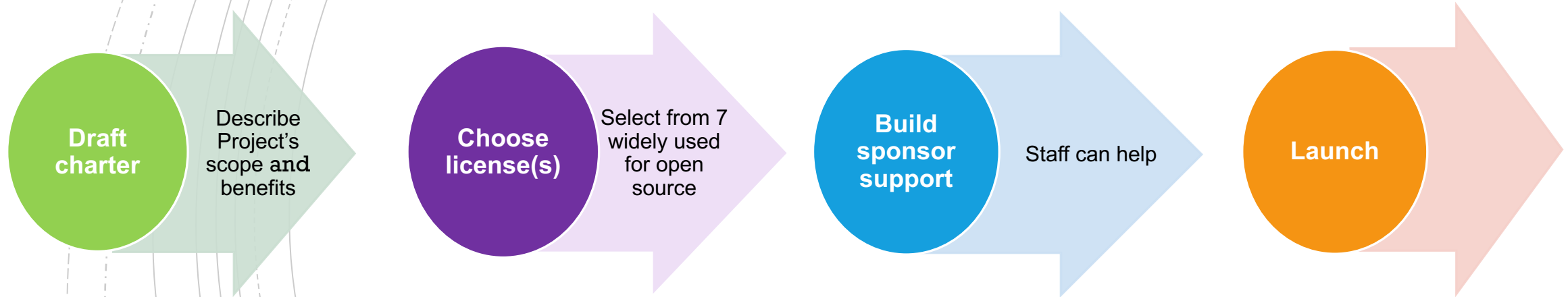


# What do sponsorship dues cover?

## Should you form an Open Project at OASIS?

Only if you want to:

- Address a business need strong enough to justify corporate support
- Attract more developers
- Avoid the legal headache of running your own project and the high cost of a Foundation
- Produce work with solid IP assurances
- Keep your project on track via stakeholder governance
- Take advantage of OASIS reputation, process experience, vetted legal policies, and outreach services
